

The Regularisation of Migrants (RegMig) dataset

The RegMig dataset is a tool to characterize programs that regularised undocumented immigrants and it is expected to allow researchers to evaluate its impact on a broad range of topics. RegMig aims to collect all possible information from programs that regularised undocumented immigrants in OECD countries for the last 80 years.

We have assembled the RegMig dataset using three core sources: First, the “Regularisation in Europe” (REGINE) project produced for the European Commission’s Directorate-General Justice, Freedom and Security (Baldwin-Edwards & Kraler, 2009); second, the University of Oxford’s International Migration Institute data (DEMIG, 2015) and third, the OECD’s international migration reports (from (OECD, 1997) to (OECD, 2023)). Additionally, we complemented the RegMig dataset using information from Apap, De Bruycker, & Schmitter (2000), Levinson, (2005), IADB, Acosta, & Harris (2022), McDonald (2009), Dehm & Vogl (2022) and Sunderhaus (2007) , mainly. It was completed further using several sources for each country¹. As a result, this novel dataset allows us to identify all regularisation programs implemented in each of the 38 OECD countries.

It is important to highlight the difference between programs and mechanism. The first meet three criteria: (i) they do not form part of the regular migration policy framework, (ii) they operate for a limited time period, and (iii) they target specific categories of non-nationals in an irregular situation (Baldwin-Edwards & Kraler, 2009). While the mechanisms in contrast are permanent procedures, established in legislation that have not a stablished expiration date.

RegMig classifies programs into two types. First, the general category includes all regularisation programs that target overstayers, those who entered illegally, and rejected asylum seekers. Second, the humanitarian category only targets the rejected asylum seekers. This dataset pretends to be exhaustive in both types of programs. However, it includes the third type of regularisations, the mechanism. RegMig is not intending to be exhaustive for mechanisms but include a good amount as to clarify that they were evaluated and could not be considered programs.

Our dataset records the OECD countries that implemented regularisation of undocumented immigrants. It collects the year (or years) when the policy allowed undocumented migrants to register in the program and the origin nationalities included as beneficiaries. Additionally, when available, it registers the date it was announced, the time window for migrants to register in months, and the required time as an illegal resident in the country to classify as a beneficiary. Also, when the number of beneficiaries is available, it is recorded in the dataset. The total registered number of beneficiaries for the period is 17.85 million, but the actual number is superior, as for many programs, we found no information on beneficiaries. The dataset comprises 80 years (1945-2024). More information on how this dataset was built is on Elguezabal & Martínez-Zarzoso (2026). Please, cite this dataset as following:
